"A lot of times the parents and their own struggles are a huge piece of helping the children move forward," she says.



Now may be the time to book your airline tickets, but if you have been prescribed a medication for your ADHD symptoms, or your child has, you need to be prepared to travel with your medications. International travelers especially must be aware of laws regarding their medications in other countries.

The U.S. Department of State describes the situation of a U.S. citizen who was arrested in Japan last year after having her stimulant medication shipped to her while visiting. She had the medication repackaged in the hope of protecting her privacy. Her prescription Adderall, which is an amphetamine, is not legal in Japan. Read on.


